Jasminka Petrovic is widely awarded author whose books are translated into more than 20 languages. Mothers is one of her favorite. With her unique humor, touching and heartwarming, Jasminka describes 15 types of mothers in everyday situations. This book is made for children as well as for mothers, and most of all to those irreplaceable moments when they meet above the book.

Author about the book:

"Very important book in my opinion is the book Mothers, because it overcomes the prejudices on mothers. My aim was to look at different types of mothers from different angles. It is usual for mothers to read about children but this book is written for children to help them understand their mothers. This is so important because even though there is always love in this relationship, understanding is very often missing. Mother and child should not be 'two worlds'. What this book offers is a coming together of these 'two worlds' in the best possible way."

Jasminka Petrovic was born in Belgrade, Serbia, in 1960. Worked for 16 years in marketing agencies and as a radio journalist. She was editor-in-chief of National Geographic Junior for Serbia. Married, with two children. Jasminka wrote ten books: "Giggy Makes a Sea" (anti-war story), "School" (humorous presentation of school days), Sex for Beginners (it is a book for young people about to enter the exciting and mysterious "world of sexuality"), Say "Good Morning to the lady" (an autobiography novel), "Bon Ton" (a funny and humorous approach to a serious subject), "Rainbow valley" (it's a two level story: at one it's a fairy tale about good

and evil and on the other it's a story on chess), "Mothers" (fifteen stories about mothers), "How to Become and Stay Stupid" (a manual for children on learning techniques), "On the Button and Happiness" (a story about a boy suffering from cerebral paralysis), "This is the worst day of my life" (teenage novel).

You're ashamed when she packs you a piece of lemon meringue pie for elevenses, and crispy chicken wings for the school outing.

Make puppets from Mummy's old wooden spoons:

You will need: wool for the hair, a felt-tip pen for drawing the face, a piece of material for the clothes, cardboard for the various details, glue...

When you've made the puppets, call your friends round and together think up a story from which you can make a theatre performance. Then invite all your mothers to the première!

When she leaves the house, she reminds you: "Mummy's little pet, mind you don't get dirty!"


When she compliments one of your friends, she says: "She's a real doll!"
